



Description:

Amebelodon was one of the elephant-like animals that had "shovel tusks." In size and appearance they were similar to the modern elephant and grew to heights of 10 feet. The skull and tusks of Amebelodon were however quite different than the living elephant. They had side by side, flattened, and elongated tusks projecting from their lower jaws. These tusks extended for about 3 feet and formed a spadelike edge. The tusks were used for scooping plants from the bottoms of ponds.
